

WHY PLANT ROOTED CUTTING *Poplars?*

- Poplars reduce erosion on pastoral slopes by 95%
- Poplars create great shade and shelter so stock can graze for longer
- Poplars planted at 10mx10m tick the ETS box
- Poplars are beautiful trees, and grow great timber

Are you grazing with sheep or cattle?



Plant a rooted cutting poplar and protect with a guard and stake or add a hotwire around the outside

Exclude for three to five years then graze

Use a hotwire from an existing electric fence or across paddock corners to add shade

Surround the tree with an Ekidna tree guard and stake use again when tree bark is mature in three to five years

Plant a rooted cutting. Retire permanently with stock excluded or allow stock to graze after three to five years
